Harriet Forten Purvis (1810 – June 11, 1875) was the daughter of James Forten, an African-American abolitionist and first generation suffragist. With her mother and sisters, she formed the first biracial women's abolitionist group, the Philadelphia Female Anti-Slavery Society.

Robert Purvis (1810-1898) It's been stated that Robert Purvis was one of the nation's foremost abolitionists and was considered the "President" of the Underground Railroad. Additionally, he was active in the cause of women's rights, representing the Pennsylvania Suffrage Association at national meetings.

AND ... we have Harriet & Robert Purvis to thank for building **Byberry Hall** - the purpose-built abolition debate hall next door to our Meetinghouse (where James and Lucretia Mott, William Lloyd Garrison and other abolitionists and suffragists spoke about equality of all God's children).
